Flood watch issued for Bay Area as first storm in a month hits region

With inclement weather rolling in for the weekend, please note that we could get flooded. Please clean gutters, pick up leaves, drive carefully. - Monica

Rain from an <u>approaching storm pattern</u> that will have much of the Bay Area under a flood watch this weekend began to fall early Friday and is expected to pick up in intensity, according to the National Weather Service.

"Everything seems to be on track," NWS meteorologist Joe Merchant said as areas of the North Bay were first to feel the rain. He added that for much of Friday and into Saturday, the region would see a "steady batch of rainfall."

The heaviest precipitation on Friday is expected to hit areas of the North Bay in Sonoma and Napa counties, as the first wave of the system arrives. That storm is expected to have more of an influence in the northern part of the region and state, before a second round in the pattern rolls through closer to the central part of the region and state early early into next week.

"The second pattern is gonna be a classic atmospheric river-type storm," Merchant said. "The moderate to heavy rainfall is going to shift south."

First and foremost, I want to emphasize that the Sheriff's Office has always enforced, and will continue to enforce, laws fairly and equally, regardless of immigration status. If a crime is committed, our community can expect the Sheriff's Office to provide the same level of service and resources, irrespective of immigration status.

Regarding immigration enforcement, the Sheriff's Office will continue to adhere to California Senate Bill 54 (2017), also known as the California Values Act. This law prohibits law enforcement from investigating, detaining, reporting, or arresting individuals solely for immigration enforcement purposes. However, we will continue to cooperate with all law enforcement agencies—local, state, and federal—on cases involving violent individuals, regardless of their immigration status. Our focus is not on immigration status; it is on public safety.

The Sheriff's Office remains committed to keeping our communities safe, and a resident's immigration status does not influence how we enforce laws or solve crimes. Our community can expect the same high standard of public safety we have always provided.

Presidental Executive Orders – How do they work?

Types of executive actions of the President:

- Orders
- Memorandums
- Proclamations



Executive Orders are directed toward and govern the actions

of government officials and agencies. They have the force of law, only if it is founded on the authority of the president derived from the Constitution or statute and are required to be published in the Federal Register (the daily journal of the federal government) to notify the public. In addition, executive orders don't have to be approved and cannot simply be overturned by Congress, according to the American Bar Association (ABA). However, Congress and the courts can potentially block executive orders in other ways.

"Congress may pass legislation that might make it difficult, or even impossible, to carry out the order, such as removing funding. Only a sitting U.S. President may overturn an existing executive order by issuing another executive order to that effect." (ABA's website)

Good examples: include Roosevelt's 1942 order authorizing the incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II, Truman's 1948 executive order desegregating the U.S. military and President Obama's 2012 order issuing Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA).

Executive Memorandums are similar but differ in process: They are not required to cite the president's legal authority or be printed in the Federal Register, which makes them harder to track. They

are signed by the president and are used to manage administrative matters of the federal government.

Obama issued over 400 memorandums on topics such as gun control to immigration and overtime regulations, while Trump used them during his first term to take actions such as tightening asylum laws and imposing tariffs on China.

<u>Presidential Proclamations</u>, typically concern the activities of private individuals and do not usually have the force of law. They are typically used to provide information about holidays, commemorations and federal observances. A recent example is that Biden issued a proclamation announcing the death of former president, Jimmy Carter, in which her ordered flags to flown at half-staff for 30 days and designated a National Day of Mourning.

Transgender rights under new Presidential Administration

I received the following letter from a concerned member of the public. Let me be clear that my office will continue to work with all state and federal leaders to ensure that persons are protected under the law.

"My stress levels have gone way up from the high levels they normally are at. As such, I am writing to you in hope that you or your team can perhaps start providing some guidance for us in your newsletters.

Monica (I hope you're okay with me calling you Monica). I have no idea if you or your team are supportive of the Trans community or if you are one of the countless that would love it if we just disappeared, but I truly can't get any response from others. So, I am reaching out to you due to my concerns and fear.

I don't have any idea how much you know about Donald Trump's decisions he has implemented regarding Transgender people but from what we have read, it is looking like EVERY SINGLE Trans person is going to have to DeTransition in their paperwork, even if they have physically fully transitioned. We are trying to find out if this is the case.

Additionally, we are trying to figure out what laws are being broken on our part if we do not reverse our gender markers. Some of us having transitioned as far back as 60 years ago.

We are terrified about what an arrest will mean to many of us. From what Trump has provided as the expectations, if we are arrested, we will be put in the jail that matches our ORIGINAL GENDER. Many of us have gotten full surgical transitioning done. We no longer have a Penis but rather, we have a vagina. I don't know if you can envision what will happen when we are put into a male prison but so far, too many Transwomen have died from rape.

Now, many of us, people who have never been arrested in our lives. People who have spent the greater part of their lives JUST TRYING to live a peaceful and loving life could go to JAIL just for using the wrong Restroom.

Worse, we could easily be targeted by people and harassed and falsely arrested for actions that we did not do, only to be found innocent at a later time, during of which, we will have been in jail. There are many people who would gladly do such a horrific thing like this. Heck, I myself have had run-ins where people have literally tried to hit me with their car in a parking lot. They heard me on my phone, identified my voice as male, and all I was doing was walking towards the hospital from my car in the parking lot.

Please help us better understand what is happening so that we are not misreading into everything Donald Trump has provided. Please, many of us are terrified to leave our home even."

Westbound I-80 Express Lane in Vacaville opening as temporary HOV lane ahead of formal launch in late 2025



The new westbound Interstate 80 (I-80) express lane between Vacaville and Fairfield will soon be open to California motorists as a temporary high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lane.

If all goes according to plan, we expect to pull up the barriers and cones currently occupying the lane by **mid-February**. Here's what you need to know about temporary access:

- Caltrans has made substantial progress on the express lane project, but the tolling equipment won't be fully up and running until late 2025 at the earliest
- In the meantime, Caltrans will soon open the far-left lane on westbound I-80 between the I-505 interchange and Airbase Parkway to high-occupancy vehicles, better known as carpool vehicles, with two or more travelers during posted hours.
- Caltrans is currently in the final stages of installing HOV signage and striping the road. Once that is done, we will make a final announcement and open the temporary HOV lane.
- Once open, the lane will be available to vehicles with two or more people on board on weekdays from 5 to 10 a.m. and 3 to 7 p.m.
- Outside of those hours, the lane will be open to all
- Work to install tolling equipment will continue throughout this period, typically through overnight lane closures. As always, we ask motorists to please be mindful of their speed for the safety of our workers
- We expect to formally launch the completed express lane by late 2025. Until then, please enjoy the extra room on westbound Interstate 80 beginning in mid-February

CHP Expands Support To Assist VPD In Addressing Reckless Driving & Sideshows



From the Vallejo Police Department:

The Vallejo Police Department (VPD) is proud to announce a collaboration with the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to address the ongoing challenges of sideshows and reckless driving within the City of Vallejo. This surge, initiated under the authorization of Governor Gavin Newsom, aligns with recently enacted legislation designed to strengthen

enforcement and increase penalties for these dangerous activities.

Governor Newsom recently signed four key assembly bills (AB) into law, empowering law enforcement to take stronger action against illegal sideshows and street takeovers:

AB 1978: Grants law enforcement greater authority to impound vehicles involved in speed contests or exhibitions, regardless of whether the driver is arrested.

AB 2186: Closes existing loopholes by allowing the impoundment of vehicles used in speed exhibitions within off-street parking facilities.

AB 2807: Establishes standardized terminology for "sideshows" and "street takeovers" across California to streamline enforcement and prosecution efforts.

AB 3085: Authorizes law enforcement to obtain warrants for the seizure and impoundment of vehicles associated with sideshows, including those used to support or facilitate these events.

Beginning in the coming weeks, CHP will support VPD by conducting multiple operations per month during evening weekend hours. These operations will involve additional CHP officers supplementing VPD resources to enhance our ability to respond swiftly and effectively to sideshow activity. Together, the two agencies will enforce all California Vehicle Code (CVC) laws, aiming to deter and disrupt reckless driving while holding offenders accountable for jeopardizing public safety.

"These additional resources will allow us to expand our efforts using both traditional and non-traditional enforcement strategies," said Chief Ta. "We are also developing follow-up investigation techniques to address these incidents effectively and deter future occurrences."

The new legislation provides law enforcement agencies with essential tools to combat the growing threat of illegal street activities that endanger drivers, pedestrians, and neighborhoods.

The partnership between CHP and VPD underscores our shared commitment to public safety and our determination to combat reckless driving and sideshows. This increased collaboration will create a safer environment for Vallejo's residents, businesses, and stakeholders.

The Vallejo Police Department will continue to share updates on these operations and their positive impact on community safety.

Western Monarch Count Comes to Solano County

Every year, Western Monarch butterflies make their seasonal migration back to overwintering sites. This long migration happens during the fall into winter along the western coast of North America, and while most of these sites are further south, there are at least three in Solano County, two of which have been newly discovered.

The Xerces Society has a program called the Western Monarch Count (WMC) which occurs from late October through early January collecting data on the population status of Western Monarch butterflies, which counts the number of monarchs

clustering in trees and specifically where they are located. Solano County has a couple of overwintering sites which consist of clusters of large trees mainly redwood, eucalyptus, Monterey pine and cypress.

This year, Solano RCD took an active role in helping to coordinate the Western Monarch Counts at Chapel Park, along with scouting two new potential overwintering sites at Glen Cove Waterfront Park in Vallejo and Touro University on Mare Island. These will be added to the WMC map of overwintering sites, and we plan to lead official counts in the years to come!

Overall, counts have been lower than in previous years. Due to these low numbers, overall, a 95% decline since the 1980s with fewer than 2,000 being counted in 2020, the Fish and Wildlife service has proposed protection under the federal Endangered Species

State Route 37 Sears Point to Mare Island Improvement Project



State Route 37 is an important regional connection linking the north, east and west SF Bay Region following along the northern shore of San Pablo Bay. This 21-mile-long roadway from US 101 to

I-80 connects job markets and housing within Marin, Sonoma, Napa and Solano counties.

The future of the State Route 37 Corridor requires finding solutions to traffic congestion, periodic flooding, and rising sea levels. But it will also require balancing transportation needs with protecting and enhancing sensitive marshland habitats. Planning a long-term solution presents an opportunity to provide bicycle, pedestrian, transit, and carpool options for all travelers, and enhance the quality of life for residents and build stronger local and regional economy for all. Caltrans is working with its <u>partner agencies</u>, The Metropolitan Transportation Commission and the four North Bay County Transportation Agencies to develop a more resilient corridor.

VCUSD Board of Education narrows down school closure and consolidation options for Feb. 19 vote



On Wednesday, Jan. 22, the Vallejo City Unified School District (VCUSD) held a Governing Board Study Session to address the critical issue

of school closures and consolidations. After further evaluation, the board identified three amenable options to move forward with and instructed staff to draft resolutions for a vote at the Feb. 19 regular board meeting.

The proposed options, set to take effect at the start of the 2025-26 school year, include the following:

- Mare Island Health and Fitness Academy Closure and Relocation of Vallejo Charter School: Mare Island Health and Fitness Academy will close. Vallejo Charter School will move to the Mare Island campus for the 2025-26 school year. The district would repurpose the Vallejo Charter School property.
- Reconfiguration of Loma Vista Environmental Science Academy: Grades 6-8 would move to Solano Widenmann Leadership Academy, converting Loma Vista into a TK-5 school. The district will convert the middle school's current space for expanded learning programs or other needs, such as professional development.
- 3. Closure of Loma Vista Environmental Science Academy: The district will close the entire school and allocate the space for district use, excluding the farm.

Additionally, discussions touched on the potential future consolidation of Pennycook Elementary and Steffan Manor Elementary into a single school and the closure and/or consolidation of Federal Terrace Elementary and Lincoln Elementary. However, these actions would not occur in this initial phase of cuts but are being considered for the 2026-27 school year and beyond.

"We understand that these decisions significantly affect families, and we remain committed to prioritizing student success and equity throughout this process," said VCUSD Superintendent Rubén Aurelio. "Our goal is to maintain fiscal responsibility while providing high-quality educational opportunities."

Discussions about school closures and consolidations stem from a steady decline in enrollment, ongoing deficit spending, and the

district's commitment to improving academic outcomes for all students.

To accommodate a larger audience, the Board of Education will hold its Feb. 19 meeting at Mare Island Health and Fitness Academy, located at 400 Rickover St, Vallejo, CA 94592.

The public portion of the meeting will begin at 6 p.m. and will be live streamed on the district's <u>YouTube page</u> for those unable to attend in person. Spanish translation services will be provided. For accommodations, please contact the superintendent's office at 707-556-8921 x50002.

City of Fairfield Launches Edible Food Recovery Program



Starting in early February, the city of Fairfield Public Works Department will launch the Edible Food Recovery (EFR) Program in partnership with Solano County.

This program is a key element of Senate Bill 1383 (SB 1383), which mandates certain businesses to donate edible food to food recovery organizations, such as a food bank, rather than throwing it away. The EFR Program aims to help alleviate food insecurity and redistribute this recovered food to help feed people in need.

In December 2024, the City of Fairfield and Solano County entered into an agreement for the County to administer the EFR program on the City's behalf. County Environmental Health staff will conduct site visits and work with businesses to ensure food donations are safely donated and adequately documented.

Businesses required to participate are categorized as either Tier 1 or Tier 2 generators, and City staff will assist the County with outreach and food recovery efforts for these businesses. The City and County have also been in contact with the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano and plan to work collaboratively to strengthen and grow existing food recovery networks.

Solano County Water Agency accepting entries for Water Awareness Video Contest



The Solano County Water Agency is now accepting entries from Solano County students in grades 6 through 12 and their sponsoring teachers for the Water Agency's 15th annual video contest. Winning entries will receive up to \$1,500.

This year's theme is The Water Cycle: Why We Need to Think Outside the Sink. The contest is challenging students to explore the need for Solano County residents to think globally and act locally in order to conserve water.

Students should create a one-minute public service announcement video explaining how we can all work together to conserve water on a broad scale. In their PSAs, we encourage students to think about all the different ways people, industries, and institutions use water,

and to offer creative conservation steps for individuals and our society at-large to take.

This year, the Solano County Water Agency will award prizes of \$1,500 to the first-place video, \$1,000 to the second-place video, and \$500 to the third-place video. Additionally, the winning entry from each school with ten or more submissions will be awarded a \$100 gift card. The three teachers who generate the most student participation in the contest will each win a \$200 gift card.

Entries will be judged by a panel of water efficiency experts and community leaders for content, accuracy, and response to the assigned theme; entertainment value and originality; videography, style and organization; and audio/sound quality.





Born to a military family in Honolulu, Hawaii, LaCoursiere attended Montville High School where he played junior varsity football, varsity football and varsity track.







How We Create Pandemics, From Our Bodies to Our Beliefs with Smithsonian Curator Sabrina Sholts



Join in for this enlightening presentation with Smithsonian curator Sabrina Sholts as she talks about how the very fact of being human increases our pandemic risks—and gives us the power to save ourselves.

The COVID-19 pandemic won't be our last—because what makes us vulnerable to pandemics also makes us human. That is the uncomfortable but all-too-timely message of *The Human Disease:* How We Create Pandemics, From Our Bodies to Our Beliefs, which

travels through history and around the globe to examine how and why pandemics are an inescapable threat of our own making. Drawing on dozens of disciplines—from medicine, epidemiology, and microbiology to anthropology, sociology, ecology, and neuroscience—as well as a unique expertise in public education about emerging infectious diseases, biological anthropologist Sabrina Sholts identifies the human traits and tendencies that double as pandemic liabilities, from the anatomy that defines us to the misperceptions that divide us.

Weaving together a wealth of personal experiences, scientific findings, and historical stories, Sholts brings dramatic and muchneeded clarity to one of the most profound challenges we face as a species. Though the COVID-19 pandemic looms large in Sholts's account, it is, in fact, just one of the many infectious disease events explored in *The Human Disease*. With its expansive, evolutionary perspective, the book explains how humanity will continue to face new pandemics because *humans cause them*, by the ways that we are and the things that we do. By recognizing our risks, Sholts suggests, we can take actions to reduce them. When the next pandemic happens, and how bad it becomes, are largely within our highly capable human hands—and will be determined by what we do with our extraordinary human brains.
