1. **Call to Order / Introductions**

The meeting was called to order by Chair Dunbar 9:05 a.m.

2. **Public Comment**

The following is verbatim testimony.

June Guidotti: "June Guidotti, I just saw Narcisa here distributing maps (unintelligible)...anything to do with this meeting? On the public comment on this agenda today, number two it's me. Again they have not stated what I said at the meeting. They left out things, they pick and choose what they want to say. And I say a lot in my three minutes normally. So I object to the fact that the act (unintelligible)... violation they don't have the right to alter what I say. But it seems to be consistent with what goes on in Resource Management in the (unintelligible). Also I find that very time (unintelligible) for me and continual harassment that I get from this department and from Resource Management and the Transportation Department. I also have concerns about the agenda that is being changed and the amendments to the General Plan and that my attorney fought nine months to get one typing error changed on my fire insurance from section three back up to section four. But in the General Plan and working with Jim Dunbar working with the staff that I feel he has a conflict of interest. That their changing the zoning and they're changing the sections and land uses and I object to ... but I still ... Jim Leland got a little hot yesterday when my daughter was talking to him. And he's saying that ... 'well your application has been sitting on my desk and you never paid this fee, you never did that'. I've been excluded from this and I resent that my vested rights have been taken from me and this composting facility it's phase one has never done any CEQA nor an initial study, nothing has been done to protect... But Narcisa will get up at the end of the meeting and say 'well I object' or Jane Bogner has her little speech that overrides it. Jane Bogner for 10 years had one meeting in the Local Task Force meeting. Kevin Cullen that used to work that works out at the sewer plant again. So as far as the Browns Act I hope that when the... was in the front page of the paper that the treasury department has to come up with the paperwork that Gary Reese's office that put the application in for Potrero Hills Landfill they still do not have a road to that landfill. But I can walk into FEMA meeting and find out that the fire department working with FEMA ..."

Dunbar: "30 seconds"

Guidotti: "...using our again taxpayers money to put in an illegal road into that landfill. Along with the fact that Jim Sperring the Board of Supervisors been caught three times taking public funds. That is not what the people voted for. So on the agenda today I expect to see what I was stating not what is been picked and 'choosed' put on the agenda and violates my rights of the public. Thank you."

Narcisa Untal asked that the minutes reflect that the papers reflecting maps that she passed to Mr. Jeff Lehfeldt, Solano Community College, was at the request of Mr.

Lehfeldt at the November LTF meeting and can be backed up by an email to Mr. Lehfeldt as well.

3. **Action Item(s)**

b. **5-year Review of Solano County's Countywide integrated Waste Management Plan**

Ms. Untal gave a presentation on the 5 year review report of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan. The County is required to submit the report to CalRecycle on behalf of its cities and the unincorporated areas of Solano County. This 5 year review is due April 2012. She reviewed the elements of the Plan with the LTF to determine if any needed to be revised, amended or updated. She asked that any comments on the report be submitted in writing by March 1st so that they can be included in the final report. At the March LTF meeting LTF members will vote to authorize the Chair to sign and submit a letter to county staff containing the LTF's final comments of the 5-Year Review of Solano County's Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan

c. **Potrero Hills Landfill Expansion and Compost Permit Update**

Chair Dunbar gave the LTF a brief update on the Potrero Hills Landfill expansion and compost permit. There was just a few weeks left for review at the state level. The landfill has received all of its relevant permits except the solid waste facilities permit and the individual composting permit.

Ms. Guidotti asked to comment. The following is verbatim testimony.

Guidotti: "On the ... what Jim just said about all his permits are set and ready to go, I actually filed an appeal on phase one on his composting permit because they never did any study on initial study. Well now they did it on phase two and they made a mistake and they have to redo his composting permit and this other investigation at BCDC at this time. And he still has to with ... go with ... go to the February 23rd hearing in San Francisco in regards to Measure E that I wanted to comment when Narcisa was talking. And it's very interesting when Narcisa was talking about the funding, all these years I thought the garbage company paid it to CW&E. I didn't realize CW&E paid it to the garbage companies. So all that paperwork, they have to have showing because I ... when I have appealed it to BCDC it says ten thousand dollar fine? I could never understand why that fine was never implemented. It's because CWE doesn't have to pay it. So all the fire that was just over there where all the paperwork is on Empire with the attorney that filed road ... possibly that paperwork does not exist right now.

Dunbar: "10 seconds"

Guidotti: "10 seconds, o.k. June next item. And I object to you didn't say a thing about Measure E. Because that affects everything that Narcisa is doing."

Dunbar: "Measure E is an item of ongoing litigation."

39.25 Guidotti: "From this Con Costa down there that's hauling in ...that Jerry Brown's he's not doing anything about."

Dunbar: "Ongoing litigation; there is no hearing date apparently set. There is, it's at the appellate court level in San Francisco and there is no hearing date set. The hearing date is February 23rd. It's a hearing between, a lawsuit against the BCDC for issuing the permit not in regard to Measure E but in regard to the expansion of the landfill and that's a February 23rd hearing. In regards to that the permit is in effect and all the permits we've received are in effect so ...

Guidotti: "Not true because you're in error. One of the attorneys incorporated seventy attorneys with all the lawsuits it has to protect the marsh and all you're involved in. The paper work's right here if anyone wants to see it."

Dunbar: "Thank you"

Guidotti: "Not true Jim."

Dunbar: "Thank you"

5. Member Updates

Mark Nichols, VALCORE, is gearing up for an Earth Day event on April 21st. It will be located at Marin St. between Virginia St. and Georgia St. along with the Farmers Market.

Jane Bogner, Sierra Club, is working on the Recycling Guide and asked the members to complete a survey she distributed to help her include the most user friendly and relevant information in the Guide. She also asked that they continue to send in their updates. Bogner also mentioned that she works part time at Toro University where they have a kitchen garden and all the vegetable waste is composted.

Allen Hochstetler, Concrush, said he was gathering information on the recyclability of rubberized asphalt that has been used around the state within the last 8 or 10 years. It is a new process and not much has been done yet. The average lifecycle of a rubberized asphalt paved road is around 20 years. He asked the members to contact him if they had any information on the topic.

Dolores Tiburcio, Travis Air Force Base, is working to get Wing support for a team approach for their Earth Day event this year. She is getting volunteers from the Environmental Cross Functional Team to take the lead in some of their events. Tiburcio is the overall coordinator.

Jennifer Armer, Rio Vista, introduced herself as an associate planner for the City of Rio Vista. She will be Rio Vista's direct contact to the LTF.

Sandra Gonzalez, Solano Garbage Company, introduced herself as a new representative for Solano Garbage Company.

Dave Ryan, Recycling Zone, stated that he recycles steel, copper, brass, aluminum, cardboard, shrink wrap and plastics including plastic bags (clean and dry). He encouraged the LTF to contact him regarding items they weren't sure were recyclable. Untal asked Dave if he could get back to the LTF on how the plastic bags are recycled.

Keith Nance, Rio Vista Sanitation Service, encouraged the LTF to contact Recycling Zone if they ever have truckloads or bales of any type of material they need to recycle.

Marie Knutson, Allied Waste, reported that the rate for commercial recycling is included in their commercial billing rate. The number of commercial accounts has increased. Newsletters are now going out with the residential billings. They will be starting a curbside HHW program for Benicia residents. The Pacheco facility will be switching over to natural gas trucks.

Jeff Lehfeldt, Solano Community College, reported that they had to abandon the Recycle Mania competition (colleges compete with each other to reduce water and energy use). Because they don't have dorms and the metering facilities on each of the buildings to measure and energy usage they would not be able to compete. The students are still continuing their recycling program with Solano Garbage.

Jim Dunbar, Potrero Hills Landfill, the permits for the landfill expansion and composting facility were moving along. They are doing recycling on site with more commodities.

Narcisa Untal, County of Solano, reminded members that comments on the 5 year review report of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan need to be submitted to her by March 1, 2012. At the March 15, 2012 meeting the LTF will vote to authorize the Chair to sign and submit a letter to County Staff with final comments on the 5 year review report of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan. That letter will be sent to CalRecycle along the 5 year review report. Untal also reminded the LTF that they need to receive Brown Act training once every two years. A Brown Act training will be held during the March 15th LTF meeting.

The members were also asked to review the LTF meeting dates from May forward to determine if one of the dates would be suitable for the LTF to take a tour of their facility this year. Facilities that haven't held a tour include Recology Hay Road, Jepson Prairie Organics, and Pacific Rim Recycling.

Untal reported that she is working with KUIC to air a radio ad and additional outreach for the Waste Tire Amnesty Grant. The grant will be ending June 30, 2012. The State decided that rather than approve extensions because we haven't spent the \$90,000 they will end the program on June 30th in accordance with their policies and procedures. The County will be reapplying for a grant to start up another round of tire collection thru the Waste Tire Amnesty program if the funds are available.

The Siting Element Update has been approved by five jurisdictions - Solano County Board of Supervisors, Cities of Benicia, Rio Vista, Fairfield and Vacaville. Cities remaining to approve are Dixon, Suisun City and Vallejo.

E-waste recyclers are popping up everywhere again. Untal encouraged the jurisdictions to sign off on the "Proof of Designation". This form basically states that the e-waste recycler does not have to obtain each participant's address when they drop off their e-waste materials. When the jurisdiction signs off on this form the recycler can be paid without having to turn in a list of the addresses of all the participants. She asked for the protocols of each jurisdiction on this matter so they can be posted on the website.

6. **Adjournment**

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 10:22 a.m.

This committee is in violation of the Browns Act and you're asked to submit your paperwork March 1st. When are you getting your training? March 15th. So you're in violation. So none of the meeting that you've had are legal.

SECTION 4.0 TITLE 14, CALIFORNIA CODE of REGULATIONS §18788(3) (A) - (H)

The subsections below address not only the areas of change specified in the regulations, but also provide specific analysis regarding the continued adequacy of the planning documents in light of those changes, including a determination regarding any need for a revision to one or more of the planning documents.

Section 4.1 Changes in Demographics in the County

When preparing the CIWMP Review Report, the County must address at least the changes in demographics.

Analysis:

Upon review of demographic changes since 1990¹:

- The demographic changes since the development of the CIWMP do not warrant a revision to any of the countywide planning documents.
- These demographic changes since the development of the CIWMP warrant a revision to one or more of the County's countywide planning documents. Specifically, the 1995 Countywide Siting Element (CSE) for the 15-year planning period of 1995-2009.

Additional Analysis (optional):

On September 16, 2010, the LTF recommended the County prepare an amendment to the 1995 CSE for the second 15-year planning period of 2010-2025. The amendment reflects disposal capacity analysis based on projected annual population increases from the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) *Projections** 2009.

*ABAG makes long-term forecasts on population, housing, and employment for the nine-county Bay Area and produces updated forecasts every two years published as *Projections*.

¹ The year of the data included in Solano County's original CIWMP planning documents.

Section 4.2 Changes in Quantities of Waste within the County; and Changes in Permitted Disposal Capacity and Waste Disposed in the County

This information summarizes each jurisdiction's progress in implementing the Source Reduction and Recycling Element (SRRE) and complying with the 50% diversion rate requirement (now calculated as 50% equivalent per capita disposal target), see [Per Capita Disposal and Goal Measurement \(2007 and Later\)](#) for details.

- The County continues to have adequate disposal capacity that is equal to or greater than 15 years.
- The county does not have 15 years remaining disposal capacity and the Siting Element does not provide a strategy² for obtaining 15 years remaining disposal capacity. Attached is a revision schedule for the Siting Element (Section 7).

Analysis:

- These changes in quantities of waste and changes in permitted disposal capacity since the development of the CIWMP do not warrant a revision to any of the countywide planning documents.
- Since the development of the County's CIWMP in the mid-1990's, changes in quantities of waste and permitted disposal capacity warrant a revision (amendment). Specifically, the 1995 Countywide Siting Element (CSE) for the 15-year planning period of 1995-2009. See Section 7 for amendment schedule for the planning period 2010-2025.

Additional Analysis (optional):

CalRecycle's 2008 Waste Flow by Destination report was established as the base year for the amendment to project total disposal from the County's eight jurisdictions through 2025. Total projected disposal was based on projected population increases and continued implementation of the SRRE and HHWE. Disposal capacity was determined based on a formula utilizing each landfill's remaining capacity (as of January 2009) divided by the product of current permitted maximum rate of disposal and number of permitted days open per year. These figures also reflect changes to permitted disposal capacity at the County's two privately-owned landfills resulting in a revised estimate to their remaining site life, or disposal capacity:

- Potrero Hills Landfill disposal capacity = 36 years; closure date 2045
- Recology Hay Road disposal capacity = 38.6 years; closure date 2048

² Such a strategy includes a description of the diversion or export programs to be implemented to address the solid waste capacity needs. The description shall identify the existing solid waste disposal facilities, including those outside the county that will be used to implement these programs. The description should address how the proposed programs shall provide the county with sufficient disposal capacity to meet the required minimum of 15 years of combined permitted disposal capacity.

Section 4.3 Changes in Funding Source for Administration of the CIWMP

The Solano County Board of Supervisors established the Solid Waste Planning Fee and the Solid Waste Mitigation Fee to fund the Integrated Waste Management section of the Planning Services Division of the Department of Resource Management. This section is responsible for administration and implementation of the County's CIWMP.

In 1991, the Solid Waste Planning Fee of \$50,000 was established and continues to be split annually amongst the franchise solid waste haulers based on the population of their respective service areas. The purpose of this fee is for the on-going administration of the CIWMP.

Since the initial approval of the CIWMP in 1997, the County has experienced the following changes to the **Solid Waste Mitigation Fee** that funds the on-going implementation of the CIWMP:

- In 1993, the Solid Waste Mitigation Fee was established by Solano County Ordinance No. 1469 at the rate of \$0.65 per ton of solid waste landfilled. It was assessed on the solid waste disposal facilities within the County for the purpose of recovering costs to comply with AB 939 through administration and implementation of the CIWMP.
- In 1994, the Fee was reduced to \$0.15 per ton by Ordinance No. 1495 due to anticipated increases in tonnage.
- In 2006, Ordinance No. 2006-1680 repealed Ordinance No. 1495 to cleanup ordinance language. The Fee did not change and remained the same at \$0.15 per ton.
- In 2009, Ordinance No. 2009-1705 repealed Ordinance No. 2006-1680. The Fee was increased from \$0.15 to \$0.21 per ton by Resolution No. 2009-215 due to insufficient revenue resulting from a decrease in tonnages.

The following table demonstrates the solid waste mitigation fees received based on the tonnages landfilled at the two permitted solid waste disposal facilities within the County during this Five-Year Review period:

Solid waste streams have changed significantly since 1997 due to 1) Landfill bans on toxic materials, 2) Increases in the manufacturing of recyclables for return to the marketplace, and 3) A behavioral push to reduce consumption to conserve the natural resources associated with production of consumer goods.

Solano County and its cities seek to revise the SRRE, HHWE, and SP to update program information, capture new solid waste streams, and identify commodities presenting challenges for diversion. The County does not expect these revisions to negatively impact its jurisdictions' on-going compliance with the Integrated Waste Management Act. These revisions, instead, are intended to better provide the public and our elected officials a single place to obtain up-to-date information reflective of the solid waste practices happening in Solano County today.

Section 4.7 Changes in the Implementation Schedule

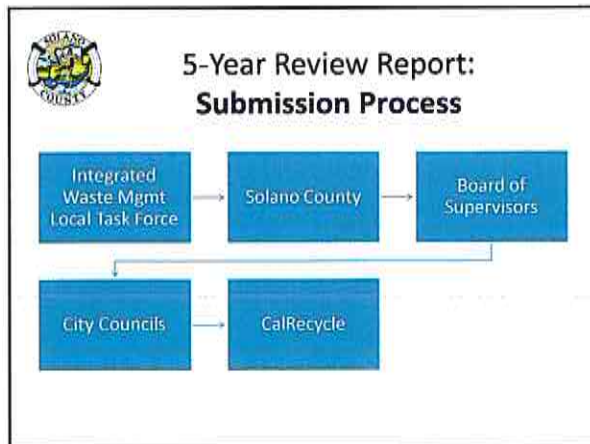

Cities to debate Solano County's waste management document

A document that proves Solano County has enough garbage capacity at its landfills for 15 years is making the rounds for city approval.

The siting element still needs to be approved by the cities of Dixon, Suisun City and Vallejo. It is likely the document will be up for discussion during meetings in the coming weeks, just in time to be added to the five-year review of Solano County's Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan that must be submitted to the state in April.

The five-year review will be conducted by the local task force and will be discussed at a meeting March 15. The review will then be submitted to CalRecycle.

Included in the review is a report on how the seven cities and unincorporated Solano County reduce solid waste and how they recycle, and how household hazardous waste is handled.

The review includes the non-disposal facility element, approved by the state in 2010, and the countywide siting element currently in the public hearing process.

Senior Planner Narcisa Untal explained that the review process will update the information because of several changes to commodities and demographics since the last review.

Also noted in the review is funding for administration. The budget of \$200,000 covers staff time and program implementation.

A Solid Waste Planning Fee is a \$50,000 annual fee split by five garbage haulers based on population served. A Solid Waste Mitigation Fee is 21 cents per

ton of landfill waste that generates

about \$150,000 per year.

Untal said the mitigation fee was actually raised for cost recovery because tonage has actually decreased, a "direct result from improved recycling."

She added that the revenue from the fees cannot be used for anything else.

Meanwhile, the permitting process for an expansion at Potrero Hills Landfill is wrapping up, according to District Manager Jim Dunbar.

He said he hopes that at the next local task force meeting on March 15 he can report that the permitting process is complete.

Requires that each City and County prepare and adopt a Nondisposal Facility Element (NDFE) which includes a description of existing and new solid waste facilities, and the expansion of existing solid waste facilities, which will be needed to implement a jurisdiction Source Reduction and Recycling Element (SRRE), to enable it to meet the requirements of Section 41730; and

WHEREAS, the NDFE may include the identification of specific locations or general areas for new solid waste facilities that will be needed to implement the SRRE; and

WHEREAS, the County has revised its Board approved NDFE to reflect revisions to the local land use permit and has submitted the revised NDFE to the Board; and


WHEREAS, based on review of the amended NDFE, Board staff found that all of the foregoing requirements have been satisfied and the amended NDFE substantially complies with PRC Section 41730, et seq., and recommends approval; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board hereby approves the revised Nondisposal Facility Element for the County. Pursuant to PRC Section 41736, at the first revision of the SRRE, the NDFE should be incorporated with the SRRE to become one document which may be modified, as necessary, to accurately reflect the existing and planned nondisposal facilities which will be used by a jurisdiction.

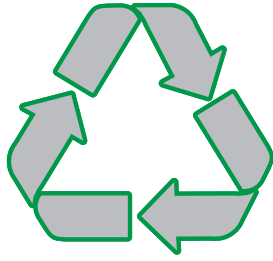

Most cities in Solano County have switched to rolling carts for recycling, yard waste and garbage. The Single-Stream Curbside Recycling system allows users to put all recyclables in one cart. Please remember to place all items in the carts and only set out when the cart is full.

This automated collection service uses trucks that have hydraulic arms that reach toward the curb to pick up a filled cart. It is important that carts are between 4 and 5 feet apart and away from cars and other items. Their wheels should touch the curb and the lid should open toward the street.

A business that generates less than 220 pounds or 27 gallons of hazardous waste a month is considered a Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator (CESQG). This program offers businesses an affordable way to comply with state laws and regulations for disposal of hazardous wastes. Wastes can be consolidated, saving each business the expense of hiring an independent waste hauler.

Protect your business and employees by disposing of unwanted, unused, and out-of-date hazardous wastes properly.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

are corrosive, toxic, reactive, or flammable materials found in our homes that are illegal to put in the trash or pour down storm drains, sewers, or on the ground. Such consumer waste products, if carelessly managed, can and frequently do, create environmental and public health hazards.

Consumers can transport a maximum of 15 gallons or 125 pounds per trip.

Universal Waste (U-Waste)

Universal Wastes are hazardous wastes that contain harmful chemicals that can be released into the environment and can contaminate our air, land and water. As of February 9, 2006, the following material will be banned from disposal in household or business trash.

What is Universal Waste?

Universal waste or "U-waste" are common items that have been traditionally thrown in the trash. They are a type of hazardous waste that can't go into the trash. They are generally accepted at HHW facilities listed on this page. Some hardware stores and home improvement stores will accept rechargeable batteries and CFLs for recycling.

- ◆ All alkaline & rechargeable batteries; lead-acid batteries (auto)
- ◆ Items containing mercury: thermostats, thermometers, switches (e.g. pilot light sensors, clothes irons, blood pressure gauge, novelties such as maze games & talking greeting cards)
- ◆ Fluorescent lamps (CFLs) & tubes, metal halide lamps, sodium vapor lamps
- ◆ Video display devices: TVs, monitors, laptops **See E-waste recycling page.**
- ◆ Electronic devices (with a digital component): computers, printers, PDAs, cell phones, telephones, radios, stereos, microwave ovens. **See E-waste recycling page**

Medicine and Eye Glasses



Medicine Disposal

In 2002, the U.S. Geological Survey sampled streams in 30 states. Measurable medicine/pharmaceutical waste was found in 80% of these streams. Long-term health effects on marine life and humans are not yet determined, but it is clear that we need to keep pharmaceuticals out of the water.

What are Medicines or Pharmaceuticals?

Pharmaceuticals are prescription drugs, over-the-counter medications, or nutritional supplements used for treatment or prevention of disease in humans or animals.

One of the primary sources of pharmaceuticals in the environment comes from flushing and pouring drugs down a drain. Pharmaceuticals are water-soluble that pass through wastewater treatment facilities and go straight into our local streams.

What should you do with unwanted pharmaceuticals?

Ask your pharmacists if they are taking back pharmaceuticals.

Costco and Kaiser pharmacies sell prepaid envelopes for customers to send unwanted medicines to a disposal facility.

A statewide take-back system is in development. In the meantime, Solano County residents should save medicines for local pharmaceutical drop-off events. For information, log onto recycle.solanocounty.com, www.earth911.com or call your recycling coordinator.

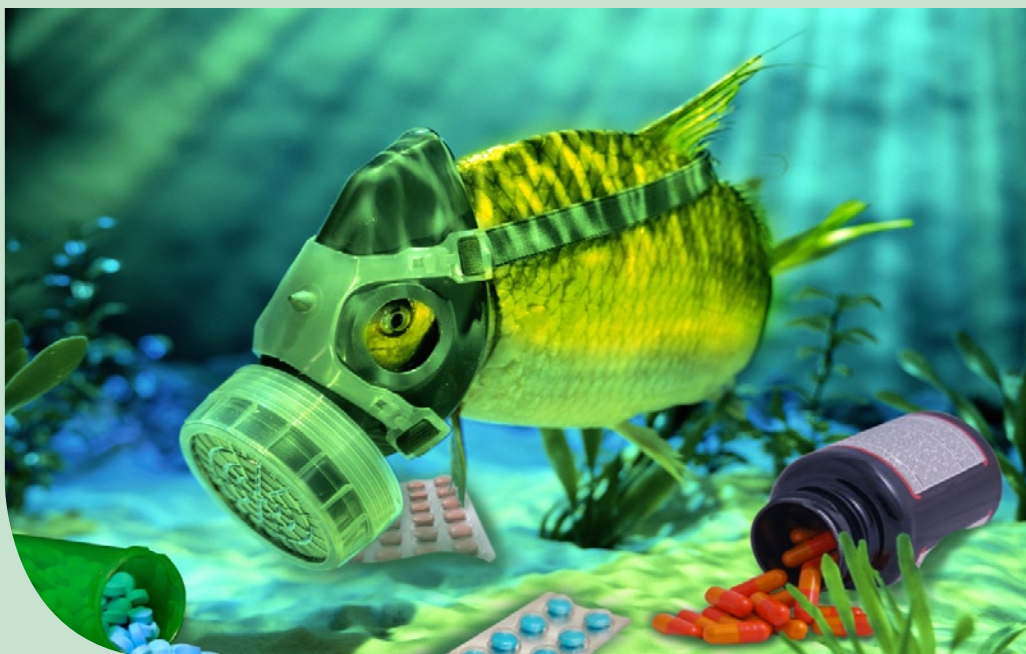
Empty liquid medication onto absorbent paper towels or rags and put in the trash.

PROPELLANT INHALER

Empty container by expelling all propellant. Put the empty cylinder in trash.

PILLS

Crush, break, or dampen pills. Mix with kitty litter or used coffee grounds to make unusable.

What Do I Do With Hypodermic Needles (Sharps)?

Effective September 1, 2008, Syringes, Hypodermic Needles and Lancets - "SHARPS" - are banned from Landfills. SHARPS cannot be put in the trash.

Please put them in a sealed container such as a heavy-duty plastic or metal container with a tight-fitting lid or an FDA-approved sharps disposal container.

Break It Down!

Whether it is recyclable or trash, you can save space in the garbage, recycling and the landfill if you simply, BREAK IT DOWN! Oversized items can take up a lot of space in your garbage/recycling container. If you can crush it, fold it, or cut it to a smaller size, you could save a lot of space.

Composting

Composting is the way Mother Nature returns organic material back to the earth so that it can replenish itself.



Backyard Composting

This type of composting uses bins and is best for grass, leaves, branches, fruit, and vegetable wastes.

Bins

Make your own or purchase one: www.composters.com. Each garden and household is unique, so choose an appropriate bin. If you have room, you can compost without a bin in a big pile or a pit.

Composting Basics

A balance of CARBON, NITROGEN, AIR and WATER is needed to make compost. If possible collect enough materials to fill your compost bin.

Carbon Or Brown Material:

Brown, dry yard and garden materials provide the carbon balance for your pile. The smaller the pieces, the faster the compost. Examples: grass clippings, leaves, twigs, hay, flowers, vacuum dirt, pine needles, and weeds that have not gone to seed. Woody branches should be chipped.

Nitrogen Or Green Material

Green materials provide the nitrogen to the pile. Always bury food scraps deep inside the pile to avoid potential odors or pest problems. Examples: vegetable and fruit waste, coffee grounds w/ filter, tea bags, egg shells, hair, fresh grass clippings, chicken/horse/ rabbit/cow manures.

Do Not Compost

Meat, Bones, Dairy Products, Greasy Foods, Diseased Plants and NEVER add cat or dog manure.

Air

is essential for Aerobic Composting
Turn your pile with a compost turning tool or garden fork or use holey pipes, bundles of bamboo/corn stalks, and woody branches to add air pockets in your pile.

Bacteria, fungus and insects that live in your compost need oxygen to work. Sufficient oxygen keeps your pile sweet smelling.

Water

Keep your pile as damp as a wrung out sponge. Compost piles need about 50% moisture. Dampen layers when building the pile then add water through perforated pipes or a jet of water. Keep a cover on open piles during hot, dry weather or rainy weather.

Composting Primer

Composting Flyers are available on the composting page at www.VALCOREcycling.org or by calling 707 55-EARTH. Local libraries also have composting books on their shelves.

Build Your Pile

by alternating equal weights of Carbon, Nitrogen. Adding a layer of finished compost or dirt will introduce bacteria to the pile.

Check weekly. If you turn your compost, it will be finished in about two months. If not, about 6 months.

Finished Compost may be used as soon as the temperature of the pile has stabilized. Finished compost has a pleasant earthy smell, few recognizable pieces of the original organic materials, and a dark brown or black color.

USES:

As A Fertilizer

Compost has a NPK (nitrogen-phosphorus-potassium) value of 1-1-1. Even with its low NPK, compost releases nutrients slowly throughout the growing season.

As A Mulch

SPREAD IT around established plants. DIG IT IN to improve soil fertility. SIFT IT into a fine mulch and use as mulch for house plants

Make Compost Tea:

Stir 1 part aged compost into 5 parts water, let sit a few minutes, then water plants. Add water 3 or 4 more times.

Earthworm Composting

Worm bins are typically used for fruit and vegetable waste from your kitchen and is designed for apartment dwellers or those with small yards. Small bins are filled with moist shredded paper, food scraps and red wiggler earthworms. [Flyer available]

Why Recycle Used Oil?

Did you know that used motor oil never wears out? It just gets dirty and can be recycled, cleaned, and used again. Recycling used motor oil conserves a natural resource and is good for the environment too! Motor oil poured onto the ground, into storm drains, or tossed into trash cans (even in a sealed container) can contaminate and pollute the soil, groundwater, streams, and rivers. Recycling your used motor oil reduces this pollution threat.

About the Certified Centers

The California Integrated Waste Management Board certifies used oil recycling centers throughout the state. Certified Used Oil Collection Centers take used motor oil from the public and pay 40¢/gallon. Most centers will take up to 5 gallons at a time. Please call companies before bringing in used oil to check for space in their oil recycling barrels.

What About Contaminated Oil?

Certified center will not accept used motor oil that is contaminated with other fluids such as antifreeze, solvents, gasoline, or water. If your used oil accidentally gets contaminated, it must be taken to your city's hazardous waste facility listed on Page 2.

Se requiere hacer una cita, y hay un costo por este servicio. Aceite Usado de Motor

¿Sabía usted que el aceite usado de motor nunca se desgasta? El aceite solamente se ensucia y puede ser reciclado, puede limpiarse y se puede volver a utilizar. ¡El reciclaje de aceite usado de motor conserva un recurso natural y también es bueno para el medio ambiente! El aceite de motor que se derrama sobre el suelo, en las alcantarillas, o que se tira en los botes de basura (incluso en un contenedor sellado), puede contaminar el suelo, las aguas subterráneas, los arroyos y los ríos. El reciclaje de su aceite usado de motor reduce esta amenaza de contaminación.

Vea la página 15 donde encontrara una lista de centros de recolección de aceite usado de motor certificados. Estos negocios reciben el aceite usado de motor por parte del público y pagan

.40-centavos por galón. La mayoría de los centros aceptan un máximo de 5 galones a la vez. Por favor llame a los negocios antes de traer el aceite usado para que ellos puedan revisar si hay espacio en sus barriles de aceite reciclado.

Los centros certificados no aceptan el aceite usado de motor que está contaminado con otros líquidos, tales como anticongelantes, disolventes, gasolina o agua. Si el aceite usado se contamina accidentalmente, se debe llevar al centro de recolección de residuos peligrosos de su ciudad, el cual encontrara en la página 2.

Los Residuos de Medicamentos Farmacéuticos no deben ser tirados en el inodoro/taza del baño o ser arrojados a la basura.

Cómo deshacerse de ellos:

1. Llame a su Coordinador de Reciclaje para saber la fecha del próximo evento de recolección de medicamentos.
2. Pida a su farmacéutico/boticario que acepte los medicamentos de regreso.
3. Como un último recurso: Quite toda la información personal de los contenedores, ponga los medicamentos líquidos en toallas de papel, deshágase de los inhaladores, y aplaste/triture o humedezca todas las píldoras, luego envuélvalas con seguridad y colóquelas en la basura.

Desechos Electrónicos (E-Waste)

Televisores, computadoras, monitores, equipo de oficina y aparatos electrónicos de consumo. Es prohibido tirar estos artículos en los vertederos/basureros. La lista de los lugares donde se llevan a cabo recolecciones gratuitas de aparatos electrónicos (E-Waste) durante el año se encuentra en la página 11.

Eliminación de Objetos PUNZANTES

Jeringas, Agujas Hipodérmicas y Lancetas - Es prohibido tirar los objetos "PUNZANTES" en los vertederos/basureros.

Por favor, póngalos en un recipiente sellado, tales como un contenedor de plástico de alta resistencia o un recipiente de metal con una tapa hermética, o un contenedor de eliminación de objetos punzantes aprobado por la FDA. Llévelos a uno de los sitios listados en la página 4.
