Agricultural Economic Priorities for Solano and Yolo Counties

The counties of Solano and Yolo are engaged in a concerted effort to increase the economic viability of agriculture within their borders and as a region. Both counties commissioned the University of California Agricultural Issues Center to examine their agriculture industries and incorporated many of the lessons learned from those studies into the updates of their respective general plans. The counties held a Joint Economic Summit in November 2011 to explore ways the public and private sector could collaborate to add more value to agriculture. The summit resulted in eight action areas, which affirmed many of the concepts that emerged independently in the two counties. The following examines priorities identified in various studies conducted by the respective counties over the last decade and merges them into a synopsis of common priorities for both counties.

Key areas of improvement identified by both counties:

- Creation of an Agricultural Ombudsman or "Farmbudsman"
- Land-Use decisions that support agriculture and the business people working the land, while mitigating impacts and acting as responsible stewards
- Market and promote local agriculture and products
